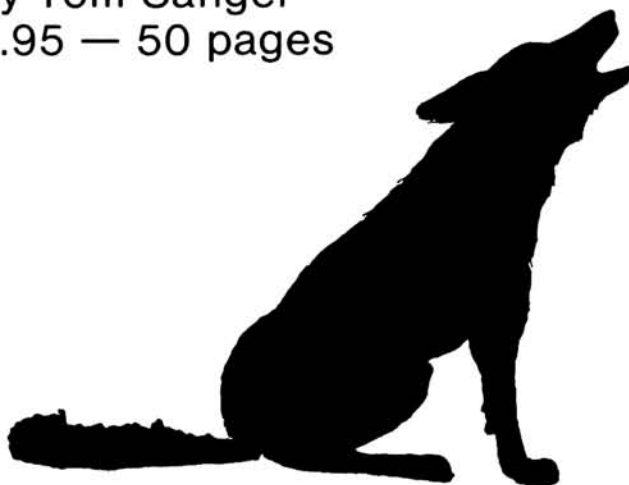

The Chumash were one of the most important tribes in California before the arrival of Europeans, and they lived along the Pacific Ocean in a region that extended from San Luis Obispo to Malibu. These fanciful stories, retold for children by Kay Sanger, tell the adventures of Coyote and his many friends, whom the Chumash believed were once people. The myths were a way for the Indians to explain their world and pass on hard-won knowledge and traditions to their children.

The stories have been retold from myths collected by the American anthropologist John Peabody Harrington early in this century. In a longer, more complex form they first appeared in Thomas Blackburn's *December's Child* (University of California Press, 1975). Mrs. Sanger has remained faithful to the original stories, while recasting them in language suited to children from the advanced elementary grades through junior high school. They retain, however, an appeal even to adults.

This volume summarizes basic information relevant to understanding native hunter-gatherer land use in the Inyo-Mono region of central eastern California. Modern biotic distributions, paleoclimatic data, ethnographic accounts, and archaeological evidence are used to develop simple models of prehistoric subsistence-settlement patterns and changes in these patterns through time for various parts of the Inyo-Mono region including Owens Valley, the Coso region, Long Valley, and the Mono Basin. Avenues for future archaeological research are discussed in terms of three broad topics uniquely appropriate to investigation in the Inyo-Mono region: long distance trade, aboriginal food production, and complex social organization.
